



Daiwa Foundation Small Grants

- £3,000-£7,000
- Open to individuals, societies, associations or other bodies in the UK or Japan to promote and support interaction between the two countries
- Cover all fields of activity, including educational and grassroots exchanges, research travel, the organisation of conferences and exhibitions
- New initiatives are especially encouraged
- Research by individual students excluded



Daiwa Foundation Awards

- £7,000-£15,000
- Collaborative projects that enable British and Japanese partners to work together, preferably within the context of an institutional relationship
- Projects in academic, professional, cultural and educational fields are eligible
- Note that scientific projects are not eligible



International Exchanges Scheme (a joint Royal Society-Daiwa Anglo-Japanese Foundation scheme)

- Up to £6,000 per annum for two years to cover travel, subsistence and research expenses
- Four deadlines a year (March, June, September, and December)
- Further details available from The Royal Society website





Daiwa Adrian Prizes

- Triennial awards that recognise significant scientific collaboration between British and Japanese research teams **next deadline: 2013**
- Submissions judged on scientific quality, past performance, future potential and likely long-term contribution to UK-Japan scientific relations
- Named after Professor Richard Adrian FRS, the 2nd Baron Adrian (1927-95)
